Whether you are living with a mental health condition, navigating substance use, or feeling overwhelmed by stress, we are here to listen and provide support. We work collaboratively with you to develop a recovery plan that reflects your goals, strengths, and what matters most to you. Care is available regardless of income, insurance status, or ability to pay.

FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO



Dear Friends, Staff, and Community Partners,

I am proud to introduce our Annual Report, a reflection of what is possible when a community comes together around a shared commitment. Each step forward was made possible by you – our talented staff, our dedicated board of directors, our incredible community partners, our generous donors and friends, and our courageous clients who trust us with their care. In 2025, our collective commitment to recovery deepened and expanded in meaningful ways.

Across Newport County, more young people and families accessed high-quality, trauma-informed care than ever before. Through school-based partnerships, our specialized children's crisis response known as MRSS, and our expanded outpatient services for children and teens, we reduced barriers to treatment and supported families in crisis. Our clinicians responded to tragedies in the community involving young people and worked side by side with educators to bring more support for children and teens directly into their schools.

Emergency services remained a powerful example of collaboration in action. Our Mobile Crisis and Rhode Island Outreach (RIO) teams provided 24/7 response across Newport County, delivering compassionate support in homes, schools, and public spaces. Through our RIO team, we became an active partner in Newport County's Situation Table, working alongside our community partners to proactively identify and support at-risk individuals before crises escalate.

Collaborations like these strengthen outcomes for every person we serve. Throughout Newport County and beyond, we work in close partnership with state and federal leaders, local municipalities, the five other Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs) in Rhode Island, first responders, healthcare providers, schools, and community-based organizations, all united by a shared commitment to improving the quality of life for Rhode Islanders.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to working together with our partners to advance true integrated care. This means that when we support a client, we do not just focus on behavioral health – we also consider other important factors like primary medical care, stable housing, access to food, and employment support. For every individual, we assess and address these social needs alongside their mental health, making sure nothing falls through the cracks. By collaborating across these different systems, we make care less fragmented, fill in service gaps, and create a community that can respond quickly and effectively to people's needs.

The true reach of our work shone at this year's Rock the Beach charity gala, when a member of our Board, during his remarks, had a simple request: would everyone who had been touched in some way by behavioral health challenges please stand? Every single person in the room rose to their feet. In that quiet, powerful moment, we felt both the weight and the unity of our shared experience. It reaffirmed why we do this work and why collaboration matters so deeply. Together, we are building a community where healing is possible, where asking for help is met with compassion, and where every person who stands up knows they are not standing alone.

I wanted to take a moment to share my experience with the incredible team at Newport Mental Health. From day one, I was treated with respect, dignity, and genuine care. When I first sought services, I was at one of the lowest points in my life – facing court-ordered counseling and other requirements, with very little hope and in true crisis. My goal was to complete counseling and other services so I could regain my driver's license and work toward a healthier life.

During this time, I had the privilege of working with Melissa Barrett, Stephanie Simone, and Jill Burke. I have never encountered such a dedicated and compassionate group of professionals. Melissa Barrett, in particular, has been my counselor throughout treatment and is truly one of the most empathetic, skilled clinicians I have ever met. Her commitment to my recovery has been extraordinary – she even went out of her way to pick me up for appointments when I was unable to drive.

Melissa created a safe, nonjudgmental environment that allowed me to grow, learn, and truly get better. Her dedication has been life changing, and I honestly don't know where I would be without her support. She is an incredible asset to your organization and a gift to the patients she serves.

I would also like to add that Stephanie Simone and Jill Burke have been instrumental in getting me back on track as well. Their professionalism, encouragement, and support have made a significant difference in my progress and overall well-being.

Please know that the team you have assembled is making a profound difference in people's lives. I am deeply grateful for the care I received and wanted to ensure that their hard work and compassion are recognized at the highest level.

Thank you for all that you do to support your staff and the community.

A child in grade school entered services with Newport Mental Health after a difficult hospitalization. The caregivers were struggling with the child's complex needs, and the child also faced challenges adjusting to home and school.

From the beginning, the child showed a powerful desire to feel safe and understood. The caregivers showed equal resolve, even on the hardest days. Meeting at home and at school, our Intensive In-Home Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services (IICAPS) team helped the child build coping skills while guiding the caregivers in understanding trauma, attachment, and behavior through a compassionate lens. Together, they established shared goals and slowly built a foundation of safety, communication, and trust.

Progress came steadily. Their home gradually shifted from crisis to connection, and big emotions were met with structure, patience, and care. Six months into treatment, their situation was stable and hopeful, and they were soon discharged – a powerful testament to the transformative impact of IICAPS at Newport Mental Health.

Children's Services Expand, Adds Research Study

Children and adolescents ages 4 to 17 make up more than 16% of Newport Mental Health's clients, with nearly one-third seeking support for anxiety. In response, Newport Mental Health expanded access to specialized, evidence-based care through a new research partnership with **Brown University Health's Pediatric Anxiety Research Center (PARC)**.



IMPACT-RI is a five-year study in which Newport Mental Health clinicians provide exposure-based Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), a highly effective treatment for childhood

anxiety and OCD. Clinicians also receive coaching

from Brown faculty psychologists, building lasting expertise that will benefit children and families well beyond the study. Participating children are randomly assigned to one of three care models – telehealth, in-person home or community-based treatment, or a hybrid model – allowing researchers to evaluate how each model improves access to care.

Another significant advancement was the successful development of the **Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS) program**. MRSS offers 24/7 access to emergency behavioral health support, connecting Newport County families with clinically trained staff experienced in working with children and youth in crisis.

Newport Mental Health offers a continuum of services for children, teens, and young adults, including Out-patient Therapy, Enhanced Outpatient Services (EOS), Intensive In-Home Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services (IICAPS), and Healthy Transitions.

Substance Use Disorder Treatment Provides Whole-Person Care

At Newport Mental Health, we see every day how alcohol use and chronic illness intersect, and we understand how important it is to manage both through coordinated support.

“Alcohol use has skyrocketed,” says Dr. Philip Schmitt, one of the psychiatrists on our Medication-Assisted Treatment team. In 2025, more than 36% of our clients were living with a substance use disorder, most of them struggling with alcohol.

“Naltrexone and Acamprosate have transformed the MAT approach,” says Dr. Schmitt. These evidence-based

medications are safe for most people managing other chronic conditions, allowing treatment to address addiction without compromising physical health. Clients utilizing MAT are monitored closely by our team and, in partnership with East Bay Community Action Program, we operate a part-time primary care clinic to help track and support their overall health and monitor any co-occurring illness.

This whole-person, collaborative approach empowers individuals to make informed choices and build healthier lives. This strengthens not only recovery, but long-term well-being.



October 2025 marked the first year of Rhode Island's statewide Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) initiative, building on our long-standing leadership in this model. Newport Mental Health was awarded Rhode Island's first federal CCBHC grant in 2018, positioning us as a leader in comprehensive, coordinated behavioral healthcare. With the state's adoption of the CCBHC framework, we further expanded our programs and services. We are proud to partner with the State of Rhode Island in advancing this work and strengthening community-based care that meets people where they are.

Emergency Services Receives Recognition from the Governor

Newport Mental Health is an active member of the Rhode Island Disaster Medical Assistance Team's Medical Reserve Corps, a highly trained coalition of professionals with expertise in public health, emergency medicine, and crisis response who mobilize during emergencies across the state. Our team responded twice in 2025.

- In June, clinicians provided compassionate, trauma-informed support following the tragic incident in Portsmouth that claimed the life of a 15-year-old student and critically injured a 17-year-old who continues to recover.
- In December, clinicians supported students, families, and the campus community following the unimaginable loss of two students in the shooting at Brown University.

Governor Daniel McKee awarded Newport Mental Health a Certificate of Special Recognition honoring

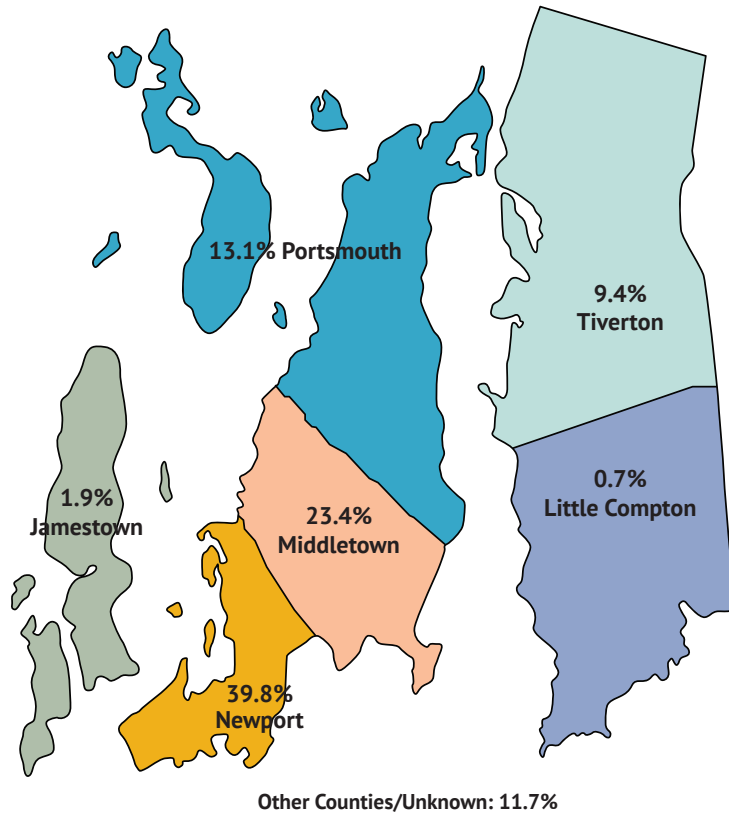

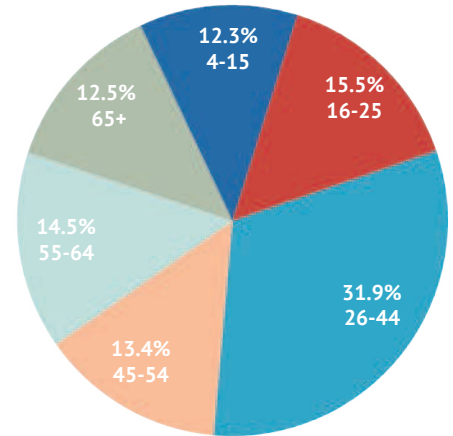


Snapshot of Our 2,723 Clients

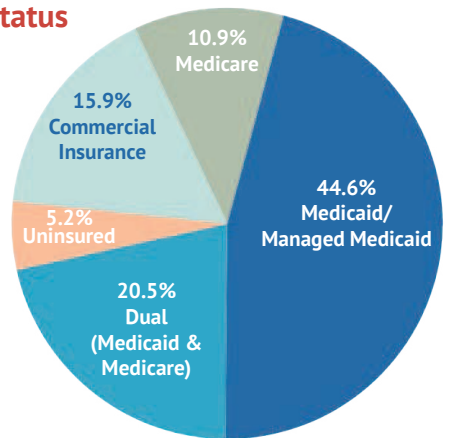
Where Our Clients Live

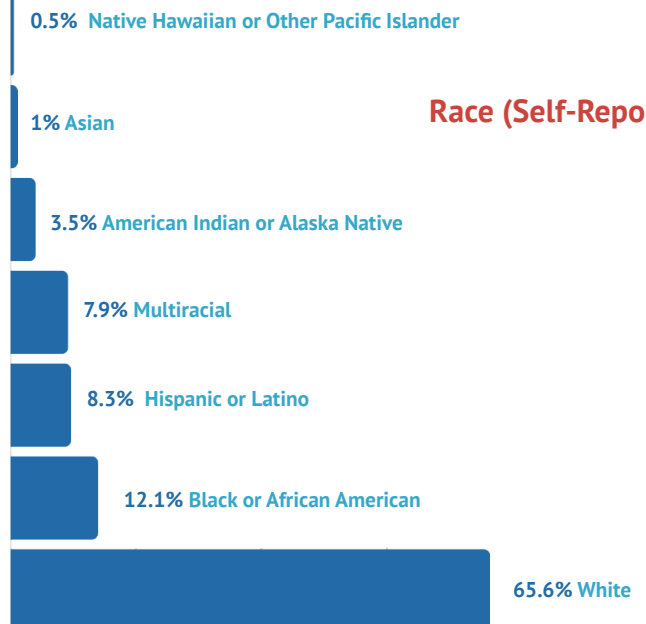

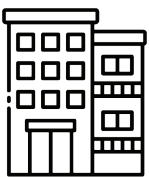

More than a fundraiser, the September 25th event was a powerful reminder of how deeply mental health touches our lives and the strength we find when we come together as a community.

Thanks to the generosity and spirited bidding of the crowd, the gala raised nearly \$220,000 in support of vital behavioral health programs in Newport County.

The night was filled with heartfelt moments, including a moving message of hope and recovery from a Newport Mental Health client, reminding everyone why this cause is so important.

Another special highlight was the presentation of a generous \$30,000 check from Presenting Sponsor Lobby Muddy Fest, whose ongoing support continues to fuel Newport Mental Health’s mission.

“What started as an idea to raise some money and spark some conversation around mental health has now grown into multiple annual events that allow us to donate to an organization that we care about deeply,” said Tyler Bernadyn, NMH board member and co-founder of Lobby Muddy Fest. “Our small ripple in a big pond is now making waves, and we are happy to join everyone attending the gala in making a difference in this community, and in the lives of people we may know or never even meet.”

The 2026 event will be re-imagined as a community focused benefit, and will be held September 24 at the Newport Beach House.



Charity Golf Tournament Drives Home Awareness

The “Drive for Mental Health” Charity Golf Tournament, presented by Horan Building Company, brought together a record 124 golfers and 15 major sponsors in an inspiring display of competition and compassion. This annual event, held at The Aquidneck Club and benefiting Newport Mental Health’s Annual Fund, raised more than \$150,000 to support essential programs and services for individuals in Newport County who are facing behavioral health and substance use challenges.

Mark Horan, NMH board member and founder and president of Horan Building Company, which has been the tournament’s lead sponsor for past five years, reflected on why the cause means so much to him. “I’ve seen the need in the community,” he says. “Mental health touches everybody. Our hope is to raise awareness so more people know support is available.”

The first annual gathering was held in the stunning Restoration Hall at IYRS School of Technology and Trades on July 23rd. Guests enjoyed an open-play Mah Jongg event at the perfect venue to experience the charm and excitement of a summer evening in Newport while supporting a vital cause.

Community Connections Strengthened at the Situation Table

In January 2025, Newport Mental Health joined the Situation Table, a weekly gathering of fire, police, and community partners from Newport and Middletown. More than 25 providers meet to triage specific cases of individuals and families facing elevated risk, coordinating care and support (while strictly adhering to all HIPAA guidelines) so no one falls through the cracks. In its first year of participation, the Situation Table addressed 77 situations.

Newport Mental Health participates through its Rhode Island Outreach (RIO) team, which specializes in proactive, community-based engagement. Partaja Spann, Director of Rhode Island Outreach for Newport Mental Health, says “At the Situation

Table, we collaborate in real time with our partners to identify solutions that are practical, respectful, and centered on the individual.”

This collaborative approach reflects Newport Mental Health’s commitment to early intervention, strong partnerships, and compassionate, coordinated care that strengthens the safety and well-being of our communities.

Innovative Housing Programs Launched Across Newport County

Stable housing is foundational to mental health. In 2025, Newport Mental Health strengthened access to housing supports by securing a RISEN grant and becoming a state-designated Regional Access Point (RAP). Together, these initiatives reduce barriers by connecting community members to services that can help them recover and thrive.

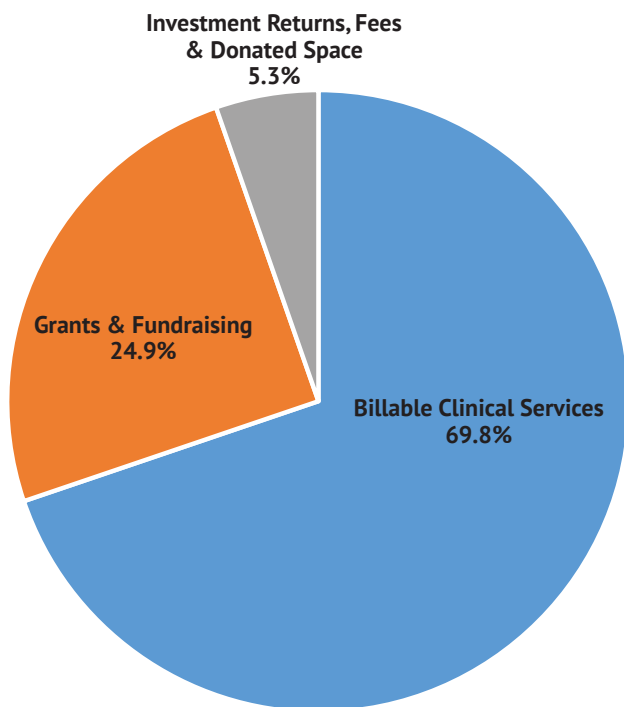
RAPs are community-based hubs designated by the Rhode Island Executive Office of Housing. As a RAP, Newport Mental Health helps individuals and families navigate housing options, stabilize existing housing,

and access state and local resources, guided by staff who understand both community needs and available supports.

The Rhode Island Systems, Engagement, Navigation (RISEN) program, funded by the Rhode Island Department of Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities & Hospitals, allows Newport Mental Health to embed case managers directly within housing developments, offering timely assistance and connections to care at locations in Newport, Middletown, and Tiverton.

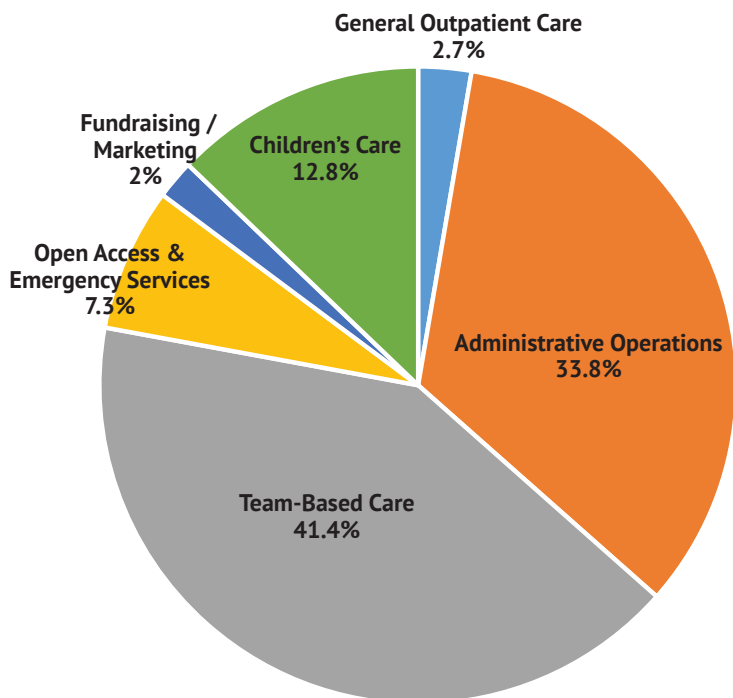
